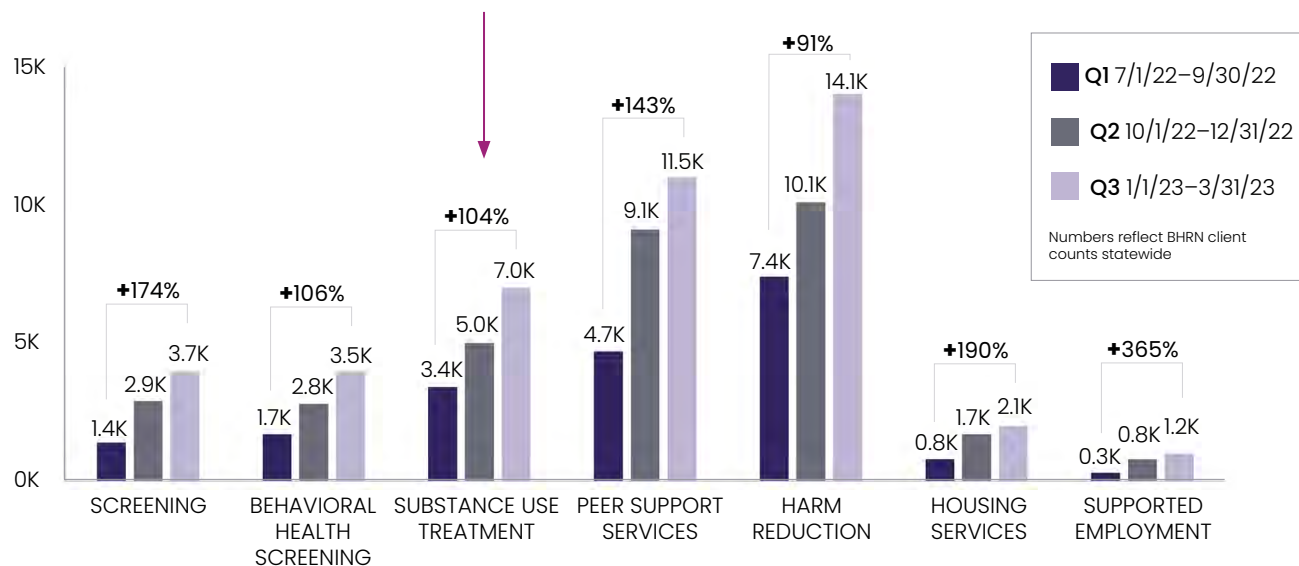


When more services are available, more people get the help they need.
